# building stronger and safer communities and places

This Annual Plan outlines how Derby's public services will work for and with local people to make sure that Derby stays a safe city where people get on well together.

The Community Safety Partnership (CSP) is made up of representatives from Derby City Council, Derbyshire Constabulary, NHS Derby City, Derby Homes, Derbyshire Probation Trust, Derbyshire Fire and Rescue Service, Derby Community Action, Nottingham Prison and Derbyshire Police Authority. There is more about our governance arrangements on page 11.

We work together, with local councillors, as the Stronger, Safer and Cleaner Communities Executive Board to make sure we deliver the actions outlined in this Annual Plan. We also share resources to help deliver those actions.

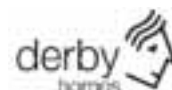
There are a number of ways that residents can get involved in the work of the CSP. We recruit and train local people to become volunteers who support youth offenders or advise on Youth Court Orders to build more cohesive communities. Residents can also get involved locally by taking part in their Neighbourhood Forum and working with their local Neighbourhood Team. See the back cover for more information.

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## How we decide our priorities

To be able to identify the key issues and risks for the city, all of our partner organisations take part in a detailed assessment of current concerns and performance information. This is called the 'Strategic Intelligence Assessment', which is completed in December each year.

### It involves:

- collecting information from every Neighbourhood Board across the city to understand local people's concerns and priorities
- studying crime and anti-social behaviour within the city to look at what happens now and what might happen in the future

- finding out the needs of people who misuse substances
- getting information from all public services to identify the problems that are affecting them
- working with national government to understand its priorities.

Once this evidence is pulled together, we set priorities that form the basis of our Annual Plan. Our Plan also reflects the key priorities which we set in our Strategic Plan for 2008-2011 and the key ambitions set in Derby's Sustainable Community Strategy 2009-11, called the '2020 Vision'.

## Our priorities for 2010-2011

Local people have told us that we need to continue to focus on:

- **preventing problems** and
- **intervening effectively when problems happen.**

Key challenges we have identified through our Strategic Intelligence Assessment in Derby are:

- alcohol-related harm
- sexual abuse and exploitation
- gangs and delinquent peer groups
- anti-social behaviour
- community confidence
- domestic and sexual violence
- violent crime

- vulnerable adults, victims and witnesses
- violent extremism
- community cohesion
- high-risk neighbourhoods
- drug-related harm
- high-risk offenders
- acquisitive crime.

### To tackle these challenges, we will:

- work with **people** who are causing problems
- support **people** who are feeling unsafe and are victims or witnesses
- focus on **places** that are (or are at risk of) facing problems.

# Working with *local people* to build stronger and safer communities

## Actions to prevent problems

### Children and young people

Some of our young people are at risk of causing problems to the community. We want to work with our young people to prevent these problems happening in the first place. To do this, we will:

- identify the children and young people at risk of committing crime or anti-social behaviour or of becoming involved in gang activity at the earliest opportunity. We will do this by working with schools to deliver intervention programmes, and will use national and local intelligence to identify those most at risk from harm
- provide interventions for children and young people at risk of misusing alcohol or drugs through active support and education. As well as harming the individual, drug and alcohol use can lead to other, more serious crimes being committed. By providing interventions through schools and other partners, we can help stop harm before it begins
- continue to work through the Derby Children's Trust to celebrate the achievements of children and young people in Derby and improve perceptions of young people by promoting the positive things that they do, because we recognise that the majority of children and young people are not at risk of causing harm.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### Children and young people

Sometimes, children and young people are involved in crime and anti-social behaviour. We need to help them to move away from these activities. Some have been affected by substance misuse or domestic violence and will need our support to reduce and remove the effects on them. To do this, we will:

- supervise all orders of the Youth Court to the highest standard to reduce the risk of children and young people re-offending
- use the full range of interventions to reduce anti-social behaviour committed by children and young people
- provide Youth Inclusion Programmes in high-risk neighbourhoods to target those at significant risk of offending
- deliver effective substance misuse services to children and young people misusing drugs or alcohol
- improve the services we provide for children and young people affected by domestic and sexual violence
- deliver interventions to build cohesion between younger and older people in specific neighbourhoods, and improve what they think of each other.

## Actions to prevent problems

### Work with parents, carers and families

There are support networks already in place for the most at risk and vulnerable people in our communities. We will continue to work with these networks to make sure that they have the support they need to help stop problems before they begin. To do this, we will:

- work with parents and carers in families of children and young people at risk of becoming involved in anti-social behaviour or crime, and support them in addressing these problematic behaviours
- work with families to promote safe and sensible drinking messages throughout the city. Alcohol not only causes particular harm to individuals, but it can also lead to other more serious crimes. Promotion of safe and sensible drinking will help to prevent these problems early on
- work with agencies in Derby to prevent sexual or domestic violence in the family, and support those who are at risk by working with our partners, and through the Family Justice Centre.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### Work with parents, carers and families

Supporting the parents, carers and families of those at risk of committing crime or anti-social behaviour can help to tackle the problems we face in our communities. To do this, we will:

- deliver parenting programmes for parents and carers of children and young people who have offended or have committed anti-social behaviour
- work with partners through the Derby Family Intervention Programme to provide interventions where it is felt that a young person's criminal or anti-social behaviour is rooted in wider family problems that need a wide-ranging and intensive response
- deliver effective services to families experiencing domestic or sexual abuse through the Derby Family Justice Centre.



The 'Engage Project', funded by the Big Lottery Fund, has helped 200 family members at risk of offending and is delivered by the Council's Family Learning and Study Support team working with SOVA, the Youth Offending Service, Derbyshire Probation Service and the Family Intervention Project.



## Actions to prevent problems

### Work with vulnerable adults, victims and witnesses

Vulnerable people in our communities may not be able to protect themselves against significant harm or exploitation. Many of these people may end up being victims of crimes or witnesses to crimes, and so it is vital that they are properly supported. To do this, we will:

- make sure anti-social behaviour services can be fully accessed by the most vulnerable people in Derby by introducing local minimum service standards for anti-social behaviour
- offer all victims of youth crime support and the opportunity to be involved in deciding activities for youth offenders
- improve access to testing and immunisation for blood-borne viruses amongst our most socially-excluded clients. This can help prevent more serious harm happening
- support individuals who are vulnerable to recruitment or who have already been recruited by violent extremists to prevent serious harm from happening
- provide effective support to those who are most vulnerable to domestic or sexual abuse, forced marriage or 'honour-based' violence, working with partners through the Family Justice Centre.



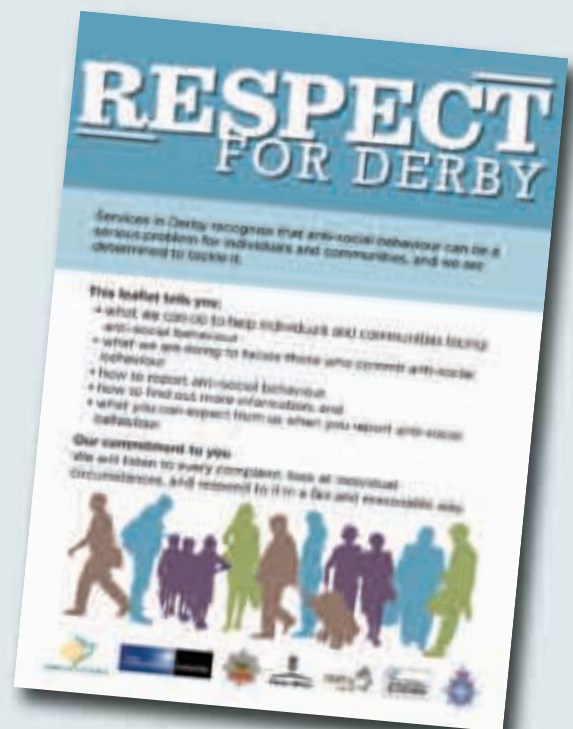

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### Work with vulnerable adults, victims and witnesses

Those people who are vulnerable in our communities are often the first to be victims of crime. To combat this, we will:

- use the full range of anti-social behaviour interventions available to protect vulnerable individuals and families
- work with other agencies to make sure that victims fleeing violence are housed in a safe place
- provide security advice to those who have been a victim of burglary to reduce the risk of becoming a repeat victim
- use the legal powers available to provide support and protection for those at risk of forced marriage
- reduce the number of overdoses and drug-related deaths amongst drug users.

## Actions to prevent problems

### Work with adults at risk of causing problems

Through our intelligence and working with communities, we can identify those adults who are at risk of causing problems to communities. We are then able to put interventions in place to help prevent these problems from happening. We will:

- reduce hate crime in Derby by targeting persistent offenders and putting relevant interventions in place
- provide drug and alcohol treatment within local neighbourhoods, for diverse communities, and identify high-risk pubs and clubs to help minimise the impact that drug and alcohol problems may have on local communities
- work with Neighbourhood Boards and the Multi-Agency Gangs Unit to implement local measures aimed at young adults at risk of becoming involved in gang activity.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### Work with adults causing problems to others

We have a number of schemes in place to identify and manage the most problematic adults in our communities, and will continue to put in place interventions to prevent them from causing harm to others. We will:

- work with our partners to identify (and intervene with) those offenders who are causing the most harm to our communities by implementing Integrated Offender Management Services
- provide effective alcohol treatment services to improve the lives of individuals who use alcohol in a problematic way
- identify and intervene with people who repeatedly commit domestic violence
- provide effective drug treatment services to help people address drug misuse problems
- improve the recovery of drug users and their reintegration in the community.

## Actions to prevent problems

### Work with all of our communities to improve cohesion and integration

All of our neighbourhoods have distinct and diverse characteristics. We want to encourage communities to have a sense of belonging to the city as a whole. We want to make sure everyone has equal and fair access to all of the support services and opportunities that are available to them. To do this, we will:

- work with our Neighbourhood Boards and Forums to identify those in our communities who may need more support in accessing the opportunities available
- provide a welcome pack for new migrants to Derby to help them access public services and increase their sense of belonging
- keep communities informed of what they can expect from us, and actively work to deal with the concerns that they identify.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### Work with all of our communities to improve cohesion and integration

A lot of work has already been done in the city to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour. We want to work with our communities so that they can see and feel the improvements that are going on in their neighbourhoods. To do this, we will:

- work closely with the Neighbourhood Boards and Forums to keep them informed about the actions we are taking, and how we are dealing with their concerns
- listen to our communities, and deal with their concerns to make real improvements to neighbourhoods and increase community confidence.

# Building stronger and safer *places*

## Actions to prevent problems

### In homes

We need to make sure that homes are places where people feel safe. To do this, we will:

- identify homes that are vulnerable to burglary and provide appropriate security measures
- provide increased security in homes and refuges for victims of domestic and sexual violence.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### In homes

Where homes have already experienced crime, we will:

- install security for victims of repeat burglary
- install security for high-risk victims of domestic or sexual abuse.

## Actions to prevent problems

### In the city centre

We want to make sure that the city centre is a place where everyone feels able to visit and enjoy. To do this, we will:

- address the availability and use of alcohol in Derby city centre and encourage responsible drinking
- develop and co-ordinate measures to tackle the risk of crime and disorder posed by the evening and night-time economy
- work with planning services to make sure that new developments in the city centre are built to be resilient to crime and disorder
- work with high-risk city centre businesses to reduce the risk of crime and anti-social behaviour.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### In the city centre

We want to reduce the risk of crime and anti-social behaviour in the city centre. To do this, we will:

- deliver 'on-street' services with our partners to minimise crime and anti-social behaviour in the city centre
- reduce visible anti-social behaviour caused by street drinkers
- actively enforce licensing laws and the new codes of practice for the drinks industry across the city to encourage responsible alcohol retailing.



The CSP is helping Derby city centre retailers to tackle robbery, shoplifting and anti-social behaviour through the use of 'AlertBox' and 'Storewatch' schemes.





## Actions to prevent problems

### In neighbourhoods

Our neighbourhoods need to be places where we want to live, work and play. We want to make sure that we have strong, safe and confident neighbourhoods. To do this, we will:

- work with Derby City Partnership to make sure that all our neighbourhoods have the same opportunities in all aspects of living
- work with Neighbourhood Boards and communities to take steps to prevent anti-social behaviour in local areas
- deploy drug and alcohol workers in 'hot spot' areas experiencing alcohol-related anti-social behaviour
- work with Neighbourhood Boards and communities to promote and develop community cohesion
- work with Neighbourhood Boards and communities to build a sense of belonging in each neighbourhood
- increase the resilience of communities to violent extremist views
- work with planning services to make sure that new developments in our communities are built to be resilient to crime and disorder
- work with local businesses to reduce their vulnerability to crime through advice and practical security measures
- reduce drug-related refuse and discarded needles in the city by working closely with the Needle and Syringe Programme.

## Actions to intervene effectively when there are problems

### In neighbourhoods

Sometimes, our neighbourhoods experience particular problems. We need to be able to intervene where these problems happen and put right what is going wrong. To do this, we will:

- provide extra security interventions in high-risk neighbourhoods
- enable young people who have offended to make amends to the local community
- work with Neighbourhood Boards, communities and partners to identify where there are community tensions and support them in resolving these
- deliver a programme of targeted support to ease the pressures of legal migration on our communities and improve access to mainstream services
- work with Neighbourhood Boards to identify where people are not happy with their local area, and help to build confidence in the work of the partners and in the community
- work to deliver targeted support where concerns are identified
- work with the Police to support the use of powers to make public spaces safer and free of anti-social behaviour. These could include use of dispersal orders where there are groups causing anti-social behaviour, or using powers to close premises which are being used for anti-social or illegal purposes
- reduce the risk of gang culture in high-risk neighbourhoods by working with the Multi-Agency Gangs Team
- deliver a programme of targeted community cohesion support to equip high-risk communities to challenge and resist violent extremism
- work with faith and community leaders to build community cohesion and resilience to extremism
- provide forums for open debate and discussion of grievances in our communities.

# How will we know that we are making a difference?

We want all of our communities, including new communities to Derby, to feel that the work we do makes a difference to them and tackles the problems that are most important to them. We will work directly with our communities, through Neighbourhood Boards and Neighbourhood Forums, to ensure we are making a difference to their quality of life.

In addition, we measure and monitor a number of performance indicators that tell us how we are doing against national and local targets. Some of these indicators form part of our Local Area Agreement. This is an agreement between the partners in our city to deliver improvements in priority areas.

The Community Safety Partnership leads on performance against targets to make Derby a stronger and safer city. These targets include:

## Increasing

- the percentage of people who believe people from different backgrounds get along well together in the local area
- the percentage of people who feel they belong to their local area
- the percentage of people who feel they can influence decisions in their locality
- resilience to violent extremism

## Reducing

- people's experience of anti-social behaviour
- the number of first-time entrants to the Youth Justice System
- the number of alcohol-related hospital admissions
- the number of repeat domestic violence referrals
- the adult re-offending rate for those under probation supervision
- the total number of primary fires for every 100,000 of the population
- the number of assaults, with less serious injury

We will continue to work towards these targets to help make Derby a stronger and safer place.



# Governance

## arrangements

We report and agree our work with our Board – the Stronger, Safer and Cleaner Communities Executive Board. This group is one of the five 'cities' of Derby City Partnership. Much of the planning and delivery of our work is conducted through a range of multi-agency groups.

Our Board sets the strategic vision and direction of our work and has membership from a range of agencies:

- Director, Derby Community Safety Partnership

A number of sub-groups support the Board:

### **Stronger Strategy Group**

This group oversees the implementation of the vision, direction and priorities set by the Board within our objective of building stronger and more confident communities. This group's main focus is around the continued development and implementation of neighbourhood working, community cohesion and preventing violent extremism.

### **Safer Strategy Group**

This group sets the framework for the delivery of activities to make sure we achieve our priorities to build safer and more confident communities. This group's main focus is on delivering our work to tackle crime, anti-social behaviour, domestic and sexual violence and drug and alcohol misuse.

### **Drug and Alcohol Joint Commissioning Group**

This group supports the delivery of the Government's Drug and Alcohol Strategies at a local level, and jointly commissions and oversees the performance of all services contracted to deliver adult and young people's drug and alcohol treatment on behalf of the city's key stakeholders. It also oversees the implementation of related strategies and plans in Derby.

# Guide to terms and more about *our work*

## Acquisitive crime

This is crime to property, such as house burglary, robbery and vehicle crime.

In 2009/10, the number of burglaries taking place in the city decreased by 23.7%, bringing the figure back in line with the lowest-ever recorded figures for Derby.

## Anti-social behaviour interventions

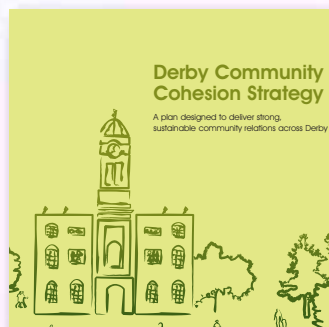
This could be a wide range of actions, with partners, that prevent and challenge anti-social behaviour including education and, where necessary, enforcement.

A programme to tackle anti-social behaviour and youth drinking led to a 35% reduction of incident referrals to the Anti-Social Behaviour Team for underage drinking between April and November in 2009 and the same period in 2008. Under the programme, led by the CSP's Challenge and Support Officer, alcohol workers from Young Addaction and youth workers from Derby City Council targeted anti-social behaviour and youth drinking 'hotspots' on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings.

## Community cohesion

This term is used to describe people from all ages and backgrounds living together, respecting each other, having a shared sense of belonging and a shared idea of what they want for their neighbourhood.

The Derby Community Cohesion Strategy vision is: "A city where people live together and respect each other."

## Community confidence

This term generally refers to people's trust in, satisfaction with, and perceptions of, effectiveness and fairness in local authorities and the Police. Confident communities tend to be ones where people feel they belong, and where people from different backgrounds get along well together and have trust in the effectiveness of local authorities.

## Derby Children's Trust

The Trust is made up of young people and senior representatives from a range of organisations that commission or provide services to children and young people and their families.

## Derby City Partnership

Derby City Partnership is a voluntary alliance of organisations that work together to create a safe, healthy, prosperous and sustainable future for the people of Derby through shared vision and leadership. Over 250 organisations are represented on Derby City Partnership groups including:

- public services - for example the Council, Community Safety Partnership, NHS, Police, Fire and Rescue Service
- local businesses, and
- community and voluntary groups.

The '2020 Vision' Derby Sustainable Community Strategy 2009-11 sets out Derby City Partnership's long-term plan to improve the quality of life for everyone in Derby.

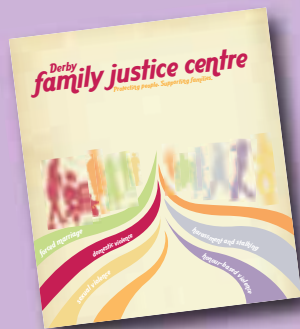
## Derby Family Intervention Project

The project, commissioned by the Community Safety Partnership and provided by Derby Homes, works with the most challenging families to help end cycles of anti-social behaviour in neighbourhoods. It is used to reinforce acceptable standards and provides support to achieve this.

## Derby Family Justice Centre

This centre, based on the second floor of St Peter's House, Gower Street, brings together organisations that work to help victims and survivors of domestic and sexual violence, including stalking, honour-based violence and forced marriage. Telephone 01332 256897.

Since it opened in June 2009, the Family Justice Centre has supported over 200 victims of domestic and sexual violence. Demand for services has led to the addition of counselling services within the Centre. Work with drug and alcohol services has led to a new partnership being explored to improve the range of services available to clients.



## Derby Integrated Offender Management Services

This is the name for the services where repeat offenders are managed by statutory agencies and partnerships, throughout the criminal justice process and beyond, in a joined-up way.

## Hate crime

The Home Office defines hate crime as: "Any incident, which constitutes a criminal offence, which is perceived by the victim or any other person as being motivated by prejudice or hate."

## High-risk city centre businesses

These are businesses in the city centre that have suffered or are likely to suffer a disproportionately high number of crimes or attempted crimes.

## High-risk local businesses

These are generally small to medium size businesses that operate in our neighbourhoods and are likely to suffer a disproportionately high number of crimes or attempted crimes.

## High-risk neighbourhoods

These are neighbourhoods that are more at risk of having an increased number of community safety problems due to a range of factors.

## High-risk offenders

These are the offending population who pose the most risk of either committing high level crime or re-offending.

## High-risk pubs and clubs

These are licensed premises that are at an increased risk of crime and disorder or the potential for disorder by the way they are managed. They may need certain restrictions imposed under a Licence Review to reduce the likelihood of crime and disorder.

## Interventions for children and young people

These are programmes of support put in place with young people to address issues that could result in criminal or anti-social behaviour. Interventions can include work with alcohol/drug use, getting young people into education, training or employment, victim awareness or anger management.

## Interventions to build cohesion

These are projects, programmes or support that help bring about better relationships between communities.

Our '**Building bridges for our shared future**' programme aims to give people from different backgrounds, cultures and ages the chance to meet and mix, and promotes a sense of belonging to Derby.

The 2009 programme included 'Arbo-Lights', an event held at dusk in Arboretum Park, Normanton during November. Run by the Forum of Faiths for Derby, the event gave people a unique opportunity to journey through the Faith History of the World and finished with a multi-coloured Interfaith Display showing how faith communities are working together.



# Guide to terms and more about *our work*

## Multi-Agency Gangs Team

This was set up with staff from the Community Safety Partnership, Council, Fire and Rescue Service, Police, Derby Homes and Probation Service in April 2009. The team focuses on preventing and reducing the involvement of both young people and adults in gang activity.

Since April 2009, the Multi-Agency Gangs Team has received more than 200 referrals from schools, parents, Police and other key agencies. The Team examines each referral and puts in place an intervention package to take the young person away from gangs. Interventions include music workshops, Ozbox and youth crime prevention programmes, and work with the young person's parents. The Team has also developed a gangs awareness programme for primary and secondary schools, and works with the community to make sure parents are supported and involved.



## Needle and Syringe Programme

This aims to reduce the transmission of blood-borne viruses and other infections caused by sharing injecting equipment. The programme also gives advice on safer injecting practices, how to avoid an overdose, and information on the safe disposal of injecting equipment.

## Neighbourhood Board

All 17 electoral wards in Derby have a Neighbourhood Board that consists of the three local ward councillors, local residents, representatives from local communities and public service partners. The Board creates a vision for the neighbourhood, sets local priorities and plans, and helps services to be 'closer' to local communities.

## Neighbourhood Forum

The Neighbourhood Forum is an open public meeting, held every few months, for all local residents, community organisations and businesses in Derby's 17 electoral wards. At the Forum, residents can raise local issues and concerns, identify key priorities for action, meet and talk to local ward councillors, providers of local services and community leaders, and find out what's happening in their neighbourhood.

## Night-time economy

This refers to the bars, pubs and clubs as well as take-aways and any other associated businesses that profit from visitors to a particular area at night.

In 2009, Derby won the Responsible Drinks Retailing award for the National Local Authority of the Year. This recognises all the work we have done to make local people feel safer when enjoying a night out in the city. The award especially recognises how Derby's major public services have worked together to achieve this.



## Reparation activities

Reparation is about young offenders being made to take responsibility for their actions and crimes. It's a practical way for young offenders to pay back or repair some of the harm caused by their offence and to enable them to give something positive back to their victim or the local community as a whole. Direct reparation activities would involve the offender making amends directly to the victim. If the victim does not want direct reparation, the offender will undertake indirect reparation activities – this consists of a variety of community reparation projects.

## Resilience

This means communities having the skills and resources to be able to tackle a problem within their own community and to challenge what is happening.

## SOVA (Supporting Others Through Volunteering)

SOVA, which has worked with the Youth Offending Service since 2000, is a national volunteer mentoring organisation in England and Wales working with: people in and leaving the care system; the criminal justice sector; young people on youth orders; socially and economically disadvantaged people; and long-term unemployed refugees and asylum seekers. It believes in strengthening communities by involving local volunteers to promote social inclusion and reduce crime.

## Substance misuse services

These are specialist services that treat people who misuse or have a problematic use of drugs and/or alcohol.

Drug treatment services in Derby treat over 1,300 people who use drugs problematically, and over 80% of these stay in treatment long enough to have a positive outcome. In 2010/11, the services will be improved to include an aftercare and support service that will provide a greater focus on people leaving treatment drug-free, re-engaging them in education and employment, and helping them to contribute positively to their local community.

Alcohol treatment services in Derby have recently been re-commissioned and are due to be launched in June 2010. The services will be able to treat up to 3,000 people who use alcohol problematically. Attention will also be focused on reducing crime associated with drinking and the wider night-time economy.



## Security interventions

This describes how security measures can be introduced to deflect or prevent offenders. It usually describes improving the physical security of someone or something to reduce the opportunity to commit crime.

## Youth inclusion programme

This describes work in neighbourhoods with young people who are identified by agencies as being at risk of becoming involved in offending or anti-social behaviour. Its main aim is to prevent young people from formally entering into the Youth Justice System.

## Youth Offending Service

The Youth Offending Service is a multi-agency service bringing together professionals from a range of organisations including the Police, social services, probation, education and health. Working together, they aim to stop offending by young people through early intervention and helping young people to change their behaviour. Telephone 01332 256820.

## Youth Order

This is imposed on a young person who has been convicted of a criminal offence. It requires the young person to work with a youth offending team for a specified period of time to address the issues behind their offending behaviour. Failing to comply with the requirements of the Order is an offence, which will result in the young person being returned to Court.

## Youth Justice System

The Youth Justice System covers the entire cycle of crime from a young person who is at risk of offending through to someone who has been sentenced. It deals with individuals up to the age of 18 and its main aim is to prevent offending. It is made up of youth offending teams, the Police, Youth Courts and institutions where young people are held in custody.
